
# AUSTRALIA : Police detain jihadist sympathizer plotting New Year's Eve attack in Melbourne

28 11 2017



A 20-year-old Australian citizen was arrested for plotting a shooting rampage in Melbourne's central square while packed with New Year's Eve revelers. Police say he was inspired by jihadist terrorists and associated with a local extremist community.

The man was rounded up during a special operation by police conducted in Werribee, some 32 kilometers southwest of Melbourne, where he lived with his Somali parents.



The suspect, who was born and raised in Australia, was handed over by police to a joint counter-terrorism team for interrogation.

*"He was engaged in acting preparation for a terrorist offense and also collecting materials, documents to facilitate a terrorist act."* Victoria Police deputy commissioner Shane Patton told the media, speaking on the essence of the charges.

*"What we will be alleging is that he was intending to use a firearm to shoot and kill as many people as he could in a Federation Square area on New Year's Eve,"* Patton said.

To this end, the man allegedly attempted to illegally obtain an automatic firearm and planned to follow Al-Qaeda manuals on how to commit a terrorist attack.

As he was about to buy a handgun, the man was swooped on by police.

The carnage was supposed to unravel at the Federation Square in downtown Melbourne, which is usually flooded with tens of thousands of people on December 31<sup>st</sup>. 2017, celebrating the arrival of a new year.

The suspect reportedly drew inspiration from terrorist attacks carried out by other Islamist fanatics all over the globe, with police saying that the man *"would become particularly energized"* when such attacks were mounted.

Describing the possible consequences of the foiled plot as *catastrophic*, Patton noted that the man does not appear to have any accomplices and police do not believe there is an acute threat to the community.



Patton revealed that police had been watching the man for a very lengthy period of time before the raid, for about a year. Police also searched his family's home in Werribee, while about a dozen police officers raided a computer store where the man was working for a couple hours a day to gain a working experience.

The owner of the store described the youngster as a "very quiet boy" whose father he met at a local mosque.

The family, meanwhile, seems to be in disbelief about the charges levelled at the 20-year-old, with his father saying on Tuesday that he believes his son has done nothing wrong.

*"He's very innocent,"* he insisted.

It's not clear how the man was indoctrinated, with police not linking him to any particular mosque. While assuring the public that *there was never any point in which there was a significant risk* emanating from the aspiring terrorist, Patton admitted that there is a net of extremists anchored in the province.

*"He is associated with other persons in the Victorian extremists community ... it is a very small community of extremist.,"* - Patton.

Since the country's terrorism threat level was upped in 2014, the police launched some 347 counter-terrorism probes, charging a total of 74 people with terrorism-related offences.

In the run-up to Christmas celebrations last year, Australian police reported that it had foiled a 'very substantial terrorist plot' in Melbourne, with Federation Square was also being named as one of the prime targets. The perpetrators reportedly wanted to use explosives and other weapons on the city's most important landmarks, including St Paul's Cathedral and Federation Square.

As recent as in September, assistant commissioner for counter-terrorism in New South Wales Mark Murdoch, now retired, said that despite all the efforts by the law enforcement and intelligence a major terrorist attack is 'inevitable' on Australian soil.

## **Christmas terrorist plot foiled in Australia, ISIS-inspired suspects arrested**

Australian authorities foiled a "very substantial terrorist plot", arresting a number of suspects who allegedly plotted a "multi-mode attack" involving guns and improvised explosives in central Melbourne over the Christmas holidays.

Seven people were detained following overnight raids by Victoria Police, the Australian Federal Police and Australian Security Intelligence Organisation (ASIO). Five people remain in custody and are answering questions about the alleged terrorist plot.

Victoria Police would like to reassure the community that the threat has been contained.

*"Overnight our police and security agencies have disrupted a very substantial terrorist plot."* - Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull.

Police believe that Islamic State inspired terrorists wanted to use explosives and other weapons on Christmas Day to target locations in the city, including St Paul's Cathedral, Federation Square and Flinders Street Station.

*"What they have uncovered is a plot to explode improvised explosive devices in central Melbourne in the area of Federation Square, on or about Christmas Day,"* Turnbull noted.



The suspects planned to attack public sites with weapons and explosives, Victoria Police Chief Commissioner Graham Ashton told journalists, adding that four of the people arrested were Australian-born and aged in their 20s.

*"The age groups range between 20 and 24 or 25. There is another suspect in this matter who will be charged that was an Egyptian-born Australian citizen. All the others were Australian-born."*

*"We believe [they are] self-radicalized. They are inspired by ISIS and ISIS propaganda,"* Ashton added, saying there was no suggestion of international assistance to suspected terrorists.

The Chief Commissioner said that those detained wanted to use a "multi-mode attack" that would involve an explosion and the use of assault weapons.

*"We believe it was certainly going to involve an explosive event ... we gathered the makings of an improvised explosive device. A substantial number of people could have been injured in the attack, from what we've seen."*

Victorian Premier Daniel Andrews, who called the plot an "act of evil" promised to increase the police presence at public places in Victoria over the Christmas period.

According to Turnbull, Australian authorities managed to thwart 12 major plots since September 2014, when the terror threat level was raised. Following 25 counterterrorism operations, some 57 people now face terrorism-related charges.



# Sydney : Two teenagers charged in botched imminent Islamic State inspired attack


An imminent terror attack allegedly inspired by Islamic State was prevented in Australia, Sydney, authorities claimed after arresting and charging two 16-year-old boys with plotting a knife assault.

Two teens were arrested by a counter-terrorism unit at a prayer hall in Sydney's Bankstown, after they allegedly purchased the bayonet-style knives from a nearby gunshop. The charges were filed on Thursday, although the specific target of the planned attack remains unknown.

*"We did prevent what we would suspect was going to be an attack."* - Deputy Commissioner of New South Wales Police Catherine Burn.

It was believed the alleged attack was imminent.

*"Had we not been in the right place at the right time ... certainly somebody, potentially today, would be, or another day*



*imminently, would be without their life."* - AFP Deputy Commissioner Michael Phelan.

The teenagers were charged with planning an act of terror and being members of Islamic State. Such crimes could result in a lifetime behind bars.

*"The events are particularly sobering for all of us, particularly given the age of these individual."* - Phelan added.

It was not disclosed how long for, or by whom, the boys were radicalised.

*"I think they had potential radicalization from potentially radicalized peers."* - Burn.

Authorities said they were "well-aware" of the boys, and closely watched them. This helped to prevent the alleged attack. Police raided four properties after the arrest, including the prayer hall and various homes.

Australia recently faced a surge in terrorism threats, including from underage terrorism.

According to government officials, six attacks have been foiled over the past year in the country and some 44 suspected terrorists have been charged since September 2014. In light of the increasing terrorism threat, Australia has been tightening its security.

A new law criminalized travel to Islamic State strongholds in Syria and Iraq. In September a new bill was introduced into the Australian parliament, proposing the indefinite detention of terror convicts and charging children as young as 14 as adults over terrorism.

*"Regrettably, children as young as 14 have been involved in terrorism-related activities. This Bill recognizes this reality and the need for appropriate safeguards,"* Australia's Attorney-General, George Brandis said as he introduced the bill.

# Islamic State-inspired attacker stabbed man with a machete-like knife.


A 22-year-old knife-wielding man inflicted multiple wounds on a 59-year old victim and attempted to stab an officer in Sydney suburb after reportedly pledging allegiance to Islamic State.

JCTT officers charged a man with committing a terrorism act and attempted murder.

The assailant was been detained on terrorism charges.

While the suspect's motives were not immediately made clear, he reportedly did not know the victim in person. Police believe that the man was incited by Islamic State propaganda.

*"We know that this person has strong religious beliefs inspired by ISIS," Deputy Commissioner Catherine Burn told a press conference, referring to the assault as "planned" and "deliberate."*



Minto Terror Attack : Running around yelling Allahu Akbar. This is a good day to die.

The attacker, whose identity remains undisclosed as well, approached the 59-year-old local with a "large knife" in a park in Minto, close to his home in Sydney's southwest. When police arrived at the scene, the assailant reportedly tried to stab an officer through a window. He was then detained. During the incident he reportedly shouted some words in Arabic, which indicated a link to Islamic State in the minds of investigators.

The alleged offender has strong extremist beliefs, inspired by ISIS, according to police. He has been known to police in the past.

A wounded victim, who suffered injuries to his body and hands, was rushed to the local hospital in critical condition.

*"This is the new face of terrorism... this is the sad reality, that people do become inspired for whatever reason by these type of calls,"* Burn said, despite not knowing the victim, whose identity has not yet been revealed. However, the suspect might have *"formed some view"* of him.

Although the attacker has been known to police *"as a person of concern"* and reputedly displayed *"odd or unusual"* behaviour during his previous encounters with law enforcement, he had not been placed on a terror watch list as he lacked any links *"to any of the matters that we are following or any of the people on our radar,"* - Burn admitted.

The man was previously tried by court on charges related to real estate.

The suspect was refused bail and charged *"with committing a terrorist act and attempted murder,"* - New South Wales's police.

# 19 year old Australian 'kangaroo bomb' plotter sentenced to 10 years.

A teenager accused of plotting a terrorist attack on a major public holiday in Australia, which involved beheading a policeman and running him over, has been given a 10-year sentence. One of his other plots envisaged attaching a bomb to a kangaroo and setting it loose.

19-year-old Sevdet Ramadan Besim was facing several terror-related charges, and pleaded guilty to one of them. The Victoria Supreme Court handed a 10-year sentence to Besim after he confessed he planned to run down a policeman and behead him on Anzac Day last year.

Besim must now spend at least seven and a half years in prison before he can apply for parole. Had he not pleaded guilty, he would have been handed a 15-year sentence.

Justice Michael Croucher : Besim had a "*putrid act*" in mind which sought to spark fear in the community, and advance jihadist ideology.

*"To the vast majority of the community, it's unfathomable an 18-year-old boy planned to kill a law enforcement officer, to crash into him with a car and then behead him with a knife."*

**Besim, who earlier said he would "love to take out some cops," planned his attack on Anzac Day to "make sure the dogs remember this as well as their fallen heroes."**

The teenager who had been seeing a moderate imam, would be undergoing a de-radicalization program.

*"I'm not persuaded to accept ... he has in fact renounced violent jihadism,"* the judge said. However, he stressed that there remain good prospects for Besim's rehabilitation given the teenager's contrition, guilty plea and strong support from his family and friends.



The court said there was clear evidence that Besim had been radicalized by older extremists he met, now defunct Al-Furqan Islamic Centre in the UK.

The death of his friend, Numan Haider, is said to have had a huge effect on Besim's state of mind. Haider was shot dead for stabbing two police officers in 2014.

Besim had been previously suspected of holding discussions about the Anzac Day terror plot with a UK teenager. The two also

allegedly talked about painting a kangaroo with an Islamic State symbol and stuffing its pouch with explosives to later "set it loose" on police officers.


Besim was one of the five teenagers arrested during police raids in April 2015 in Melbourne in connection to the foiled terror plot.

## **Major terror attack in Australia inevitable, according to counter-terrorism chief**

One of Australia's top counter-terrorism officials has joined the ranks of people advising citizens to learn to live under a threat of terrorism, saying that a major attack on Aussie soil is inevitable.

*"I don't like to say it but it will happen,"* - Mark Murdoch. The 37-year-old veteran, who serves as assistant commissioner for counter-terrorism in New South Wales, opined that *"It's inevitable"*.

*"Despite everything that is being done and the good work that law enforcement and intelligence is doing, without wanting to create unnecessary fear within the community, it's going to happen."*

Murdoch said security agencies are unable to stop radicalization through social media, and they are hard-pressed to identify potential lone wolf attacks by individuals and small groups. Such attackers only need easily-available tools to stage attacks, *"and then all of a sudden we get something like a meat grinder."*

*"What that tells us is that while we are pointed in a particular direction by intelligence sources, we need to maintain an open mind because in this business anything can happen at any time."* the official said.

Last month Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull laid out his plan to reduce the risk of terrorist attacks in the country. Among other things, it includes placing barriers in public places to prevent vehicular attacks similar to those in Nice and Barcelona.

# Lebanon helped foil Islamic State Barbie doll bomb plot in Australia

Lebanese intelligence helped foil an Islamic State terrorist attack on an airplane bound for Abu Dhabi from Sydney in July. The alleged attacker planned to blow up the plane with a bomb hidden in a Barbie doll.

Lebanese national Amer Khayyat had planned, according to Interior Minister Nouhad Machnouk, to blow up the plane 20 minutes after take-off but had to abandon his plan because the bag containing the explosives was overweight and he could not take it aboard.



*"The operation was foiled because of the extra weight. Intelligence branch followed on the case and found that Amer was involved in this act, and it appears that he was supposed to carry it out."*

He was detained upon arriving in Lebanon. His two brothers, Khaled and Mahmoud Khayyat, were arrested in Sydney in July and charged with *"two counts of acts done in preparation for, or planning, a terrorist act."*

At the time of the arrests, Deputy Commissioner for National Security Michael Phelan described the plan as *"one of the most sophisticated plots that has ever been attempted on Australian soil."*

The fourth brother, Tarek, was allegedly an Islamic State commander living in Raqqa.

The plane at the centre of the bomb plot is believed to be a July 15 Etihad flight out of Sydney, with 400 people onboard, 120 of them Lebanese nationals, according to Machnouk.

Machnouk went on to claim that the suspects wanted to punish the UAE and Australia for being part of the coalition fighting Islamic State in Syria and Iraq, and called on intelligence agencies to work together.

*"When four Lebanese brothers in Australia decide to blow up an Emirati jet, this means that the whole world should work*

*together to fight terrorism. Coordination should be 24 hours a day between all security agencies to stop such attacks."*

The Australian Federal Police confirmed that they are continuing to work closely with Lebanese authorities.

*"We have a close and cooperative relationship with the Lebanese authorities and are working closely on this investigation.,"*

*"The Australian Government has put specific measures in place to share information on this operation and investigation with our partners to ensure our international counter-terrorism efforts continue to be joined up and as robust as possible."*

# Australian police share details of sophisticated Islamic State-directed plane bomb and gas attack plots

Two men have been charged with terrorist related offenses in Australia after security authorities foiled what they called the "most sophisticated" Islamic State terrorist plot which involved bringing down a passenger plane and staging a poisonous gas attack.

Mahmoud Khayat, 32, and Khaled Mahmoud Khayat, 49, have both been charged with "two counts of acts done in preparation for, or planning, a terrorist ac.," - Australian Federal Police announced.

Details of the Islamic State inspired terrorist plots that were foiled in police raids were revealed by the Deputy Commissioner for National Security. Michael Phelan - the two men received

orders from IS to carry out "one of the most sophisticated plots that has ever been attempted on Australian soil."

Initially, the suspects allegedly tried to smuggle an IED on a July 15 Etihad flight out of Sydney. They apparently failed to breach airport security and abandoned their plan without checking-in the bag.

*"At no stage did the IED breach security,"* Phelan emphasized, noting that authorities later created a similar mock IED to make sure it would not get through the airport security.

The second, more sophisticated plot, the investigation believes, involved constructing a device that would be used to stage a gas attack in a public place, allegedly using hydrogen sulphide.



*"This hydrogen sulphide is very difficult to make so I want to make it quite clear that whilst it may have been a hypothetical plot for these people to put forward, we were a long way from having a functional device."* Phelan .

In the course of the investigation, authorities discovered that the suspects received military-grade explosives used to construct the homemade bomb from Turkey through an IS operative.

*"The IED was sent through international cargo. With assistance from the ISIL commander, the accused assembled the IED - so the*

*components of the IED, into what we believe was a functioning IED to be placed on that flight."*


On Saturday, four people were arrested in counter-terrorism raids in Sydney suburbs, after police uncovered the ISIS-inspired plot. After questioning, one of the four men who were detained was released earlier this week. Another man remains in custody without being charged. The two charged men, who face life imprisonment if found guilty, are due to appear in Parramatta Court Friday.

## **Islamic State-inspired terrorism': Plot to bring plane down foiled in Australia after Sydney raids**

Four people were arrested in late night raids by Australia's counter-terrorism task force over an alleged plot to blow up a



passenger plane, Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull confirmed. The federal police believe the planned attack was "Islamic State-inspired terrorism."

Police have obtained information that "some people in Sydney were planning to commit a terrorist attack using an improvised device," Australian Federal Police Commissioner Andrew Colvin.

The federal police are "investigating information indicating the aviation industry was potentially a target of that attack," Colvin added.

He said there was no indication that airport security was "compromised" at any time.

"Four men have been taken into custody and are assisting police with their enquiries," the Australian Federal Police said.

"The public should be reassured that our security and intelligence agencies are working tirelessly to keep us safe," PM Turnbull said in a statement.

Security at Sydney airport was stepped up in anticipation of a potential attack, with similar measures implemented at airports across the country.

Australia's terrorism threat remains at the same "probable" level as it was prior to the raids.

Turnbull advised travelers to expect delays due to increased airport security but said there was no imminent danger.

"Some of the measures will be obvious to the public, some will not be – those travelling should go about their business with confidence," Turnbull said.

"The office of transport security has advised security screening will take longer, and travelers should arrive at terminals at least two hours before flights to allow ample time for screening.

"They should limit the amount of carry-on and checked baggage, as this will help to ensure that security screening is efficient."

Turnbull released an online video statement in which he announced major reforms of Australia's counter terrorism agencies.



## **Bomb defused at property, several detainees injured**

With little information released on the suspects, some details of the counter-terrorism operations have emerged in media reports.

Following a raid in Sydney's eastern suburb of Surry Hills, a man was escorted from a house with a white sheet covering his head and shoulders. His head was wrapped with a bandage.

Before being driven away in an ambulance the man told journalists gathered at the property, that he had "no idea" what he was suspected of. "They bashed me," he said, referring to the police arrest.



An elderly woman wearing a hijab, with her face covered with a jacket, was also seen being ushered from the property by police. Another woman with her hands tied up was treated by the medics at the scene. It was unclear if any of the women would be charged. Witnesses cited by the outlet said they heard loud screams during the operation that reportedly involved around 40 armed riot police, who stormed into the house from both front and back, smashing a part of a back fence.

A bomb disposal unit was called to the scene and a street near the property was briefly sealed off. An explosive device was discovered.

Another police raid was conducted at a property located in Wiley Park, a suburb in south-western Sydney. According to neighbors, the man detained by police was aged around 50, lived with his brother, enjoyed an occasional family visit and had a thing for cats; keeping over a dozen of felines at home.

*"He was a strange man, he never looked at you in the eye when you spoke to him,"* one of the neighbors said.

In Punchbowl, also in south-western Sydney, police reportedly raided a home of a Lebanese family. Eyewitnesses said they heard a woman screaming and saw police questioning four women and a wheelchair-bound man.

*"We don't really know them, we just say hi because they're Lebanese as well. They seem like good people," neighbors were cited as saying.*

Another raid was conducted at Lakembam, south-western Sydney. Police were seen with gas masks as they entered the property.

## **Australian military gets cyberwarfare unit to battle overseas hackers**

The Australian Defence Force is getting a cyberwarfare unit for defending the country from cyber threat, as well as conducting offensive military cyber operations to shut down foreign criminal networks overseas.

*"As of tomorrow, Australia will have an information warfare division within Defence. This is a result of the changing character of contemporary conflict,"* Cyber Security Minister Dan Tehan.

Defence Signals Directorate, an intelligence agency in the Australian Government Department of Defence, will be given special powers to target civilians overseas.

The division will be responsible for "military cyber operations, intelligence, joint electronic warfare, information operations and our military's space operations," according to Tehan.

"It will integrate existing operations from across our defense forces to protect and support our ADF deployed personnel and systems. The division is authorized to conduct self-defense, passive defense, active defense and offensive operations," Tehan said



"Our new cyber capabilities will ensure offshore attacks are kept at bay, and will keep Australians safe," he added.

Earlier in June, Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull said that the country's response to cyber threat shouldn't be just defensive.

"We must take the fight to the criminals. The use of offensive cyber capabilities will add to the government's crime-fighting arsenal and form part of our broader strategy to prevent and shut down safe havens for offshore cyber criminals."

According to the website of the Australian prime minister, cybercrime costs the country's economy around AUS\$1 billion (\$767 million) a year. Since the end of 2014, the Australian authorities registered 114,000 reports of cybercrime. At least 23,700 of them were reported over the last 6 months.

*"The use of this capability, which is currently used to help target, disrupt and defeat terrorist organizations such as Islamic State, is subject to stringent legal oversight and consistent with our obligations under international law,"* the statement also said.

Australia, as well as other countries across the globe, has been recently hit by the 'Petya' ransomware attack. The attack spread to corporate systems across the world, affecting, among others, Russian state oil giant Rosneft, international shipping and energy conglomerate Maersk, and UK-based advertising and public relations company WPP.

The ransomware is similar in impact to "WannaCry" by the hacker group ShadowBrokers. That attack shut down over 200,000 computers in 150 countries.


